Robert H. Baloh, MD, PhD Director of Neuromuscular Medicine Cedars-Sinai Medical Center

Dr. Baloh began his research in CMT at Washington University in St. Louis and has an active laboratory-based research program using petri dish and animal models of demyelinating and axonal CMT. He moved to Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in 2011 to found

the Neuromuscular Medicine division, to develop active programs in neuromuscular disease research which include a multidisciplinary CMT clinic, and a research laboratory focused on the development of stem cell therapies for CMT.

He has published extensively on inherited disorders of the peripheral nervous system and is a member of the Medical Advisory Board for both the CMTA and the MDA. His research has been supported by the NIH, Burroughs Wellcome Fund, MDA, and the California Institute for Regenerative Medicine, which recently awarded him \$3 million to study the feasibility of stem cell therapies for CMT.



David F.M. Cooney, PT, CPO Swiss Balance

David F.M. Cooney is an advanced practitioner with clinical experience in lower limb prosthetics and orthotics, spinal orthotics and cranial molding helmets. David has been providing exemplary prosthetic and orthotic care for over 25 years. In addition, he has been a Registered Physical Therapist for 30 years. He holds

a Magna Cum Laude Bachelor of Science and a Master of Science degree in Physical Therapy from the USC School of Medicine. He completed the Prosthetic and Orthotics Certificate Education program at UCLA. He is certified in both prosthetics (1983) and orthotics (1984) by the American Board for Certification and maintains a current continuing education

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profile as mandated by his profession for said certification.


